Introduction

In the five years since the new Queensland Art Gallery was opened as part of the Queensland Cultural Centre, it has come to be regarded as the finest art venue in Australia and one of Brisbane's leading tourist destinations. In 1986-87 the Gallery attracted almost half a million visitors — the highest attendance per capita of any State gallery in Australia. The Gallery has become a focal point of community life and receives wide support for its many activities, which are extended throughout the State through a network of services. The past twelve months have proved to be yet another milestone in the development of appreciation of the visual arts in Queensland.

During the 1986/87 financial year the Gallery featured many significant exhibitions. Three very important exhibitions, one a major international exhibition and two major Australian exhibitions, focused national attention on the Gallery.

One of the most significant international exhibitions shown in Australia, 'Twentieth Century Masters from the Metropolitan Museum of Art, New York', attracted more than 126 000 people during its eight week run. As well as art lovers from interstate and New Zealand, visitors in tour groups came from as far west as Charleville and as far north as Cairns.

The 'Jack Manton Prize 1987' was a landmark exhibition. Fourteen Australian artists of note were invited to submit entries. The exhibition was made possible by generous sponsorship from the Manton family, through the Queensland Art Gallery Foundation, without which the exhibition could not have been mounted. Several important works were purchased from the exhibition, including the winning entry *The sunlit tower* by Lloyd Rees and works by Arthur Boyd, Albert Tucker, Leonard French and William Yaxley.

The exhibition, 'Painters and Sculptors: Diversity in Contemporary Australian Art', represents one of the most important curatorial projects yet undertaken by the Gallery. The exhibition is part of a cultural exchange with Queensland's Sister State, the Prefecture of Saitama in Japan. The Museum of Modern Art in Saitama will receive the exhibition in October 1987. This is the first major exhibition of contemporary Australian art to be seen in Japan and represents a new initiative for the Gallery in the international arena. It is hoped that in 1989 Saitama will reciprocate with a similarly representative exhibition of Japanese art.

The exhibition 'A Golden Age of Australian Art: Colonial and Impressionist Paintings from the City of Ballaarat Fine Art Gallery' was presented for an extended period during the year while the City of Ballaarat Fine Art Gallery undertook a rebuilding programme. The exhibition allowed Queenslanders to see some of the best loved images of Australian art from the Colonial and Impressionist eras.

Altogether, twenty-four exhibitions were installed, sixteen of which were initiated by the Gallery with five of these being organised from the Gallery's own Collection.

The Gallery's Extension Services Programme has been further developed and consolidated. In the last twelve

months, the Gallery has dispatched three exhibitions to twenty three centres.

Over 22 800 people participated in the programme, which required thirty-one visits by Queensland Art Gallery staff with 160 working days spent installing and demounting the exhibitions as well as presenting floor talks and lectures and conducting workshops for students, art and community groups.

In the latter part of the year under review, the Gallery began work on a programme of exhibitions to complement Expo '88. The Acting Director, Dr Caroline Turner, visited France at the invitation of the French Government to negotiate an exhibition from the Louvre at the Queensland Art Gallery, which will be a French Government contribution to the Australian Bicentenary and Expo '88. This is the first international exhibition of major significance negotiated by the Gallery and will be a highlight of the Queensland Art Gallery's Expo programme, which will also include exhibitions from Britain, Japan and Australia.

The Gallery presented a programme of exhibitions to mark the opening of the new Queensland Museum in October, 1986 and donated to the Museum an important piece of historical Queensland craft, a dressing chest c.1885, by John Mason.

The Gallery continues to be grateful for the work of the Queensland Art Gallery Foundation and Queensland Art Gallery Society.

The Queensland Art Gallery Foundation reached its target for the first Appeal during 1986/87. Since its establishment in 1979, when that Appeal was launched, funds raised by the Foundation have amounted to \$2 million, with a generous Government subsidy of \$1 million, which has allowed the Gallery to purchase some of the most significant works in its history.

The second Appeal was launched by the Minister for the Arts, the Honourable Brian Austin, M.L.A., at the Foundation's 8th Annual Dinner on 25 March 1987. The new Appeal brochure was introduced by His Excellency, the Governor of Queensland, the Honourable Sir Walter Campbell, Q.C. at the same function.

The Gallery continues to be indebted to the Foundation's Executive Director, Sir David Longland, C.M.G., current President, Sir Bruce Watson and Immediate Past President, Sir George Fisher C.M.G., for their outstanding contribution to the Queensland Art Gallery, its Collection and programmes.

The State Collection was enhanced during the year by the acquisition of the Fred Williams' painting Yan Yean 1972 with the assistance of the Queensland Art Gallery Foundation. The important Queensland wood carving Infancy, youth and maturity c.1912, by L.J. Harvey was acquired through the Queensland Art Gallery Foundation and Ede Horton's glass panel Drought '83 completed the acquisitions for the ACI Glass Collection, also through the Queensland Art Gallery Foundation. The gift from Lady Trout, John Peter Russell's La Pointe de Morestil par mer calme 1901, made under the Australian Government's

Taxation Incentives for the Arts Scheme, takes her gifts of his works of four oils and five watercolours, to a total of \$1.1 million in current values. Other significant additions to the Collection are William Robinson's *Four seasons* 1987, an ANZ Bank Bicentenary commission and Max Dupain's twenty photographs, a CSR Photography gift under the Taxation Incentives for the Arts Scheme through the Queensland Art Gallery Foundation.

A new Queensland Art Gallery Act was implemented on 16 May 1987, to standardize the legislation between the member bodies of the Queensland Cultural Centre. The legislation provided for the appointment of a Chairman, instead of a President, and a reduction in the number of Trustees from thirteen to nine. Several of the Gallery's former Trustees, including the President, retired during the course of the year and the Gallery extends its appreciation to them all.

The new Chairman of Trustees is Mr Richard Austin, former Deputy President of Trustees of The National Gallery of Victoria, former member of The Australia Council and the Museum of Modern Art in Melbourne and currently a member of the Australia Japan Foundation and the Council of Griffith University.

The appointment of the new Director of the Queensland Art Gallery, Mr Doug Hall, former Director of the Bendigo Art Gallery, was announced by the Minister for the Arts, the Honourable Brian Austin, M.L.A., on 22 January 1987, and he took up his appointment on 25 May 1987.

The Queensland Art Gallery Trustees' Medal for distinguished services to art in Queensland was presented to the Queensland Art Gallery's former Director, Mr Raoul Mellish, on 6 November 1986.

Miss Veronica Russell, former Curatorial Assistant at the Queensland Art Gallery, was presented with the Imperial Service Medal on 24 April 1987, in recognition of many years of faithful and conscientious service to the Government of Queensland.

The Collection

Australian Paintings and Sculpture

Major acquisitions during the year have been limited by the continuing rise in values within the art market. However, the Gallery was able to purchase, with the assistance of the Queensland Art Gallery Foundation, the important landscape *Yan Yean* by the Australian master Fred Williams.

Six works were acquired from the Jack Manton Prize entries, including the winning painting, *The sunlit tower* by Lloyd Rees. This acquisition was only made possible by the extraordinary generosity of the artist. Other works purchased from the Jack Manton Prize were *Bathers and Pulpit Rock* by Arthur Boyd, *Keppel Island* and *The mangrove monster No. 2* by William Yaxley, *The vortex* by Leonard French and a portrait of *Noel Counihan* by Albert Tucker.

The late colonial period is now represented in the Collection by two views of Brisbane, painted in 1885 by the then recently arrived artist Isaac Walter Jenner. These views are thought to have been prepared for possible use in 'The Picturesque Atlas of Australasia' and the *View of Hamilton* is almost identical with the engraving by Frederick B. Schell which appears in the Atlas. *Hairdressing in Bali* 1939 by Arthur Fleischmann, a sculpture acquired during the year, is also of special interest among purchases in Australian art.

Donations continue to be a major way in which important additions are made to the Collection. Brisbane art patron and former Gallery Trustee, Lady Trout, continued her generous gifting to the Gallery with a painting by the Australian artist John Peter Russell. Known as the 'lost impressionist', Russell spent nearly the whole of his artistic life — from 1885 to 1919 — in France. He was well known to several of the great European artists, Monet, Van Gogh, Toulouse Lautrec and Rodin. This gift from Lady Trout, made under the Australian Government's Taxation Incentives for the Arts Scheme, takes her gifts of Russell's works to four oils and five watercolours, making a total value of her gifts, by this artist alone, \$1.1 million, in current values.

The Gallery was fortunate to participate in the A.N.Z. Commissioning programme, which allowed State Galleries to commission contemporary Australian artists to produce a painting on a subject related to Australia's Bicentenary. Within these requirements, each State Gallery was given the freedom to select the artist of their choice, the completed work then entering the collection of that State Gallery. The Queensland Art Gallery nominated the Queensland artist, William Robinson, to paint Four seasons, a series of four paintings depicting the Australian landscape.

Miss Pamela Bell continued her generous gifts to the Gallery with three works under the Taxation Incentives for the Arts Scheme: an important early work by John Firth-Smith *Water* from 1975, David and Hermia Boyd ceramics, and a fine drawing by Charles Blackman of the writer George Johnston. The Blackman drawing was presented in

honour of Brian and Marjorie Johnstone and their special contribution to bringing modern art to Brisbane in the 1950s, 1960s and early 1970s.

Miss Grace Davies and Miss Nell Davies continued their special interest in and generous assistance to the Gallery with the establishment of a Trust Fund for acquisitions.

Gifts under the Taxation Incentives for the Arts Scheme were also made by Miss Leslie Campbell-Brown, Miss Kathleen Campbell-Brown and Mrs Violet Bennett.

Decorative Arts

The collection of the Decorative Arts of Queensland was considerably enhanced during the year. Apart from the David and Hermia Boyd wine jug and goblet set, presented by Miss Pamela Bell, there were no acquisitions from other states. The exhibition and publication for 'Carl McConnell - Master potter' was the key curatorial project during the year and it is the Gallery's second major scholarly project, assessing the contribution of individuals to the artistic life of this state. Three important ceramics were purchased from the potter. Subsequently, Carl and Bunny McConnell donated sixteen separate items which further illustrate his career from c.1948-1980. These included the significant salt glazed bottle, which he exhibited at the 'Concorso Internazionale della Ceramica d'Arte' in Faenza in 1976, and a tea and coffee set. Mr and Mrs P. Wilson presented an important Milton Moon vase, his "Fairweather" pot dated 1966, which well contrasts with McConnell's finely finished ceramics.

Miss Alison Campbell donated a jardinière decorated with sunflowers in the aesthetic manner which was produced at her grandfather's pottery, James Campbell and Sons, at Albion some time in the 1890's. It may be considered the most significant nineteenth century ceramic produced in Australia, as the modeller has been identified as James Lawrence Watts (1849-1925), Queensland's most important colonial sculptor.

L.J. Harvey, Queensland's major craft figure in the first half of this century, is now represented in the Collection by a work which fully justifies his reputation as a superb wood carver. *Infancy*, youth and maturity c.1912 was acquired through the Queensland Art Gallery Foundation.

A group of textiles by Queensland's first art weaver Cotje Reydon (active through the 1930's) was presented by her husband, Dr S. Clipsham and Miss H. MacKenzie. A Peg Mecham platter was presented by Professor Joyce Ackroyd, and a sphere by Australia's most important aboriginal craft figure, Thancoupie, was purchased.

Peg Mecham also presented a vase and bottle by Hamada Shoji, given to her while visiting Japan in 1974. They will perform a very useful function in the Collection as Hamada was a major influence on Australian ceramics, especially on Carl McConnell.

Kosta Boda Australia presented a unique piece by Ulrica Hydman-Vallien on the occasion of the 'Swedish Design' exhibition and the Queensland Art Gallery Society

presented a neon light piece, *Fountain of youth* 1982, by the New Zealander Paul Hartigan. These serve to illustrate modern developments in the Gallery's small collection of international art glass, while the department's major purchase this year, a Daum cameo glass lamp in coral and deep green c.1900, enhance the historical aspects.

Ede Horton's glass panel *Drought '83* was returned from its tour of Europe with 'Glass from Australia and New Zealand' completing the acquisitions for the ACI Glass Collection. The complete collection of thirty items, for which funds were donated by ACI International Limited through the Queensland Art Gallery Foundation, indicate the vitality and innovation of contemporary Australian glass art.

Prints, Drawings and Photographs

Important additions were made to the Prints, Drawings and Photographs collection this year, particularly in the areas of Australian drawings and photographs. Three major early drawings by John Perceval were purchased with funds from the Andrew and Lilian Pedersen Trust and a drawing by Russell Drysdale was acquired through the John Darnell Fund. A portrait of George Johnston by Charles Blackman was presented by Miss Pamela Bell and eleven drawings and silverpoints by Maria Kuhn (née Corrie) were donated to the Gallery by Miss Katherine Campbell-Brown and Miss Leslie Campbell-Brown.

The Gallery's holdings of photographs were greatly enhanced by two gifts. Ten photographs by the Queensland pictorialist photographer, Stan Berriman, were donated by his family. The donation was in memory of the artist's widow, Mrs V.E. Tremble. CSR Limited presented twenty photographs of Queensland pastoral and sugar industry subjects by Max Dupain, through the Queensland Art Gallery Foundation under the Taxation Incentives for the Arts Scheme.

The Gallery acquired seven prints by the South Australian printmaker, Barbara Hanrahan, dating from 1962-1986, with funds from the Andrew and Lilian Pedersen Trust. Arthur Boyd presented to the Gallery a full set of his *Narcissus* suite of twenty-five etchings in honour of Brian and Marjorie Johnstone, who have contributed so much to art in Queensland. Two etchings by Norman Lindsay were donated to the Gallery by Lady Cilento. A group of twenty-six hand-coloured lithographs by John Gould were presented to the Gallery by Wilson and Co. under the Taxation Incentives for the Arts Scheme.

The Queensland Art Gallery Society made a generous gift of four traditional Japanese woodblock prints to the Collection. An intaglio print by J.M.W. Turner, R.A. from his Liber Studorium set was donated by Miss P. Rosenstengel, and a watercolour drawing by Matthew Smith was presented by Mr Michael Bowman.

The year 1986-87 commenced with the conclusion on July 1 of 'Twentieth Century Masters from the Metropolitan Museum of Art, New York'. The fact that 126 000 people saw this exhibition, during its eight week display, reinforced the reputation of the Queensland Art Gallery as an ideal venue for major international touring exhibitions.

The year was distinguished by an emphasis on major inhouse exhibitions, curated and displayed at the Gallery, one of which will be sent to Japan. These exhibition initiatives, which have received resounding critical acclaim, have continued to support the development of Queensland art in particular, as well as presenting Australian art in general.

The major retrospective exhibition 'Carl McConnell: Master Potter' was curated by the Gallery's Curator of Decorative Arts. The exhibition paid tribute to this Queensland potter's life-long contribution to his craft. A major publication accompanied the exhibition.

Young, emerging and mid-career artists living in Queensland were recognised through the exhibition 'Moments in Queensland Contemporary Art'. The exhibition, displayed from 31 July - 9 September 1986, was curated by the Gallery's Curator of Australian Art (Post-1950). Its aim was to show works produced by Queensland artists during the twelve month period prior to the opening. The artists who exhibited their works in painting and sculpture were Irene Amos, Stephen Killick, Robert J. Morris, David Paulson, William Robinson and Gordon Shepherdson. These artists were selected for the quality of their works as well as for their contribution to the artistic life of Queensland. The exhibition was very well received by the media and the art community.

'The Jack Manton Prize 1987' was a landmark exhibition for the Queensland Art Gallery. It was the first major display of modern Australian art, with an accompanying major publication, to be curated by the Gallery. The catalyst for the exhibition was the sponsorship from art patron, Mr Jack Manton and his family. This totalled \$35 000, for the Prize Award (\$25 000), a subsidy for the publication (\$8 000) and for the documentary video of the exhibition (\$2 000).

Fourteen mid and late-career artists were invited to participate: Lloyd Rees, Albert Tucker, Sidney Nolan, Arthur Boyd, Sam Fullbrook, John Olsen, Leonard French, Ann Thomson, Janet Dawson, William Delafield Cook, Colin Lanceley, Brian Dunlop, Brett Whiteley and William Yaxley. The judge, Daniel Thomas, Director of the Art Gallery of South Australia, awarded the prize to Lloyd Rees for his work *The sunlit tower*. The exhibition was curated by the Gallery's Senior Curator of Australian Art (Pre-1950). Six of the artists: Lloyd Rees, Sam Fullbrook, John Olsen, Ann Thomson, William Delafield Cook and William Yaxley were present for the opening celebrations and awarding of the prize. An educational video and an enthusiastic volunteer guides' programme supported the exhibition.

This concentration on in-house exhibitions was also evident in the major project, 'Painters and Sculptors: Diversity in

Contemporary Australian Art', which opened on 19 June 1987.

The exhibition, curated by the Curator of Australian Art (Post-1950), presented works all produced within the last four years by artists who represent the main stream of Australian contemporary painting and sculpture. For this exhibition great care was taken to incorporate sculpture with painting. 'Painters and Sculptors...' represented the work of twenty-three painters and twenty one sculptors. It reflected the strength, vitality and diversity of contemporary Australian art, which is now emerging in a country long dominated by European and American art traditions. This exhibition will be the first major contemporary Australian art exhibition to be seen in Japan. It will be displayed late in 1987 at the Museum of Modern Art. Saitama under the sister province agreement between the Prefecture of Saitama and the State of Queensland. This exhibition also received wide critical acclaim.

The Queensland Art Gallery has maintained its close associations with Australian State galleries through participation in the national tours of exhibitions of the highest merit. 'Imants Tillers: Paintings for Venice...' and 'Edvard Munch: Death and Desire' both organised by the Art Gallery of South Australia; and 'Helge Larsen & Darani Lewers — A Retrospective', organised by the National Gallery of Victoria, are examples of this continuing collaboration.

During the year the Gallery also presented the highly acclaimed photography exhibition 'Images: Illusion and Reality', organised by the Australian Academy of Science and I'Académie des Sciences, Paris, from the Collection of the Société Française de Photographie, Paris. Over 66 500 visitors attended this exhibition, which traced the genesis and subsequent development of photography in many very rare and beautiful examples. The exhibition also included state-of-the-art holography and scientific imagery. This exhibition provided a special focus for a programme of exhibits presented in honour of the opening of the new Queensland Museum.

Other photographic exhibitions included the work of the American Harry Callahan, and one entitled 'In Full View', comprising large format photographs, with works by leading contemporary Australian photographers who utilized an experimental Polaroid camera.

The Gallery again continued to promote architecture and design, through the presentation of the 'Royal Australian Institute of Architects (Queensland Chapter) Awards and Civic Design Awards — 1986'. The Gallery was also responsible for negotiating the exhibition 'Design in Sweden Now' for an Australian tour with the organisers, The Swedish Institute, Stockholm. The exhibition commenced its Australian tour at the Queensland Art Gallery and during September 1986 to July 1987 travelled to the Museums and Art Galleries of the Northern Territory, Darwin, the Mint and Barracks, Sydney, Museum of Victoria, Melbourne, Tasmanian Museum and Art Gallery, Hobart, and the Burnie Art Gallery, Burnie, and was well received by each venue.

The exhibition 'A Golden Age of Australian Art...' from the City of Ballaarat Fine Art Gallery afforded the Queensland public the opportunity to view some of the best-loved images in Australian art from the Colonial and Impressionist periods of painting. The exhibition was displayed for an extended period of time while the Ballaarat Gallery undertook a rebuilding programme.

ACI International Limited has made a generous donation through the Queensland Art Gallery Foundation to acquire works by contemporary Australian glass artists. The collection displayed as the exhibition 'ACI Glass Collection' (9 May - 22 November 1987), evokes the vitality and innovation of practitioners working in a range of mediums from hotworked glass, stained glass and slumped glass to glass installations. The works of Australia's most highly regarded glass artists, Klaus Moje, Warren Langley, Ede Horton, Stan Melis, Julio Santos, Klaus Zimmer, Steven Skillitzi and others are represented.

The State Collection was enhanced during the year by the re-designed presentation of the Australian collection, which opened on 2 October 1986. The display integrates paintings, sculpture, decorative arts and works on paper and covers the period from the later colonial era to the early 1970s, including the work of twentieth century masters lan Fairweather and Jon Molvig, both of whom worked in Queensland. The works are arranged to highlight links and influences in particular periods, especially between certain groups of artists. Special prominence is given to major work produced in Queensland.

In presenting the exhibitions programme, the Gallery is indebted to the organisations and sponsors who made the development of the programme possible.

Education

Education Policy

The Education programme at the Queensland Art Gallery is designed to enhance visitors' enjoyment, appreciation and understanding of the visual arts and to foster an awareness of the State Collection. The programme caters for all age groups from young children to senior citizens. Attention is given to the needs of the disabled and disadvantaged.

Within the Gallery the Education programme comprises guided tours, lectures, floor talks, seminars, demonstrations, practical workshops, film screenings and music recitals which complement the exhibitions on display. The section also produces art resources, including publications, loan packages and audio-visual materials which are chiefly video productions. All aspects of the Volunteer Guides programme, which extends education services to visitors wishing to take guided tours of the Gallery, are co-ordinated by Education staff.

Education Officers participate directly in the Gallery's Extension Services programme by travelling with exhibitions and presenting tours, lectures and workshops to Queenslanders in regional areas. In 1986/87 Education Officers travelled with two exhibitions, 'Techniques of Drawing' and 'The Australian Landscape', visiting twenty-three centres and bringing art education resources to over 20 000 people in regional centres.

Volunteer Guides

The work of the Education Section is augmented by guided tours provided by the Gallery's Volunteer Guides seven days a week. An on-going training programme, devised and implemented by Education staff, is provided for Volunteer Guides. Annual assessments are also conducted. At 30 June, 1987 seventy-four Guides were enrolled in the programme.

Dorothy Gordon Memorial Lecture

The 1987 lecture was presented by Dr Sasha Grishin, Head, Fine Arts Department, the Australian National University, Canberra on the subject of 'Malevich: the Origins of Suprematism'. Funds to present the lecture were donated by Mr Harry Gordon, through the Queensland Art Gallery Foundation in memory of the late Dorothy Gordon, a founding member of the Volunteer Guides.

Education Programme

Over 46 000 people visited the Gallery in booked groups during the year; many more joined tours offered daily. Groups travelled from throughout Queensland including Rockhampton, Yeppoon, Mt Isa and the far west.

Special schools visiting the Gallery included Xavier Special School, Narbethong School for Visually Handicapped Children, Milperra School and Alpha groups.

The production of resource material continued with the videos 'The Jack Manton Prize' and 'William Delafield Cook' scripted and presented by Education Officer, Deborah Hart. The 'William Delafield Cook' video was

generously sponsored by Mr and Mrs Jack Manton. Education staff contributed to the publication 'Painters and Sculptors: Diversity in Contemporary Australian Art'.

Liaison with educational institutions at all levels continued throughout the year. Seminars for teachers and lectures for tertiary students were conducted frequently. Two professional development programmes were undertaken in the section.

A research project to examine the responses of pre-school children and their parents to structured Gallery viewing experiences was conducted by Education staff and a visiting scholar from the School of Early Childhood, Kelvin Grove College of Advanced Education.

Lecture Programme

Design in Sweden Now by Mr Lennart Lindkvist, Director, Swedish Society of Design on 23 July; Edvard Munch presented by Ms Gerd Woll, Curator, Munch Museum, Oslo on 13 September; Embroidery: Art, Craft or Pastime? by Ms Pauline Johnstone, formerly Department of Textiles, Victoria and Albert Museum on 21 September; a lecture series was presented in association with the exhibition 'Images: Illusion and Reality', comprising The Deception of Form by Professor Bede Morris, John Curtin School of Medical Research on 17 September, Art and Holography presented by the artist Alexander on 24 September; Things to Do and See in the Dark by David Malin, Senior Research Photographer, Anglo-Australian Observatory, on 1 October and Windows of the Past Preserved by Mark Nizette, Photographic Conservator, Australian War Memorial on 8 October. Darani Lewers and Helge Larsen discussed their work on 8 April, 1987.

In addition, Education and other Gallery professional staff participated in regular 'Artwork of the Month' talks, lectures for Gallery Society members and the mini-lecture series which complemented the Exhibition 'A Golden Age of Australia Art...' from the Ballaarat Fine Art Gallery.

Studio Programme

The Education Section offers a series of practical art activities in the Studio. The classes include a range of workshops for children and adults which are designed to allow participants to explore their creative potential with the assistance of experienced tutors.

Education staff also contributed to art activities conducted under the auspices of the Queensland Cultural Centre Trust, including "Under Eights Week" and "Fun for the Young".

The Trustees' Children's Creative Art Scholarship class, for children between eight and twelve years of age, offers free tuition for a year to twenty-four students.

William Buttner Scholarship

In 1986 the artist Carolyn Dodds was awarded the inaugural William Buttner Scholarship of \$5 000 to enable her to undertake a series of printmaking workshops in Queensland regional centres in late 1987.

Extension Services

Music Programme

An important and integral feature of the public programme is the series of music recitals presented to complement works on display. The programme, enjoyed by over 7 000 people, is sponsored by the Queensland Art Gallery Society. International, national and local performers participated in the programme through the year.

During the year three exhibitions travelled to twenty-three regional centres throughout Queensland. Two of the exhibitions, 'Techniques of Drawing' and 'The Australian Landscape' were accompanied by Education Officers who presented lectures, floor talks, guided tours and workshops for visitors.

Over 20 000 people participated directly in these art education activities. Education Officers also gave School of the Art broadcasts from Mt Isa and Charleville.

Exhibitions

The Australian Landscape

The major contribution to the touring exhibitions programme was the exhibition 'The Australian Landscape'. It is the largest and most valuable exhibition yet to tour so extensively within any Australian State. The Gallery's strong commitment to tour significant works from the State Collection is indicated by this project. 'The Australian Landscape' tour over the last two years has attracted extensive interest. The exhibition focuses on artists' different interpretations of the Australian landscape since the nineteenth century. It includes works by some of Australia's most significant and best known painters such as Arthur Streeton, Hans Heysen, Lloyd Rees, Russell Drysdale and Arthur Boyd.

The exhibition has been generously sponsored by Anaconda Australia Inc. through the Queensland Art Gallery Foundation.

CSR Photography Project—Selected Works

Consultancy

The Queensland Art Gallery has implemented a policy of providing assistance to communities planning or operating a public art gallery.

Over the past year the Gallery's professional staff has advised and assisted a number of regional centres including the Gold Coast, Stanthorpe, Noosa, Toowoomba, Roma and Dalby to establish or improve facilities.

The development and up-grading of facilities throughout regional Queensland will ensure that original art works will be seen in centres best able to provide for their adequate display and safety. The geographical isolation and climatic factors encountered in Queensland demand that centres offer facilities which demonstrate the highest standards of environmental and security controls to enable the State's artistic heritage to be shared safely among all Queenslanders.

Carl McConnell: Master potter was produced to accompany the exhibition of the same name on display at the Queensland Art Gallery from 28 August to 23 November 1986.

A book complementing the exhibition *The Jack Manton Prize 1987: Recent works by fourteen Australian artists* proved very popular, selling out prior to the closure of the exhibition. *Painters and Sculptors: Diversity in contemporary Australian art*, a book featuring twenty-three painters and twenty-one sculptors, was produced in June 1987 to accompany the exhibition of the same name and continues to sell extraordinarily well.

Printed checklists of works were produced to accompany various in-house and travelling exhibitions.

The Gallery's news and information bulletin *What's On* was produced bi-monthly, once again proving a successful medium for providing people with up to date news and information on exhibitions, public programmes, new acquisitions, and other Gallery, Gallery Society and Foundation activities.

The stock of postcards produced since the Gallery opened in its new premises has almost sold out.

Requests for reproduction of works from the Collection have increased during 1986-87.

Advice was on copyright matters relating to the reproduction of artworks continues to be sought from the Section.

Registration

During the 1986/87 period, 458 objects entered the temporary custody of the Queensland Art Gallery as acquisition submissions, study loans and exhibition loans.

The Department took delivery of all touring exhibitions to be shown at the Queensland Art Gallery and was also responsible for supervision of the subsequent unpacking, handling, repacking and despatch of these exhibitions. The Department was also responsible for the loan agreements, transport and insurance arrangements for the 240 objects borrowed for inclusion in Queensland Art Gallery initiated exhibitions.

Thirty-two paintings and sculptures from the Collection of the Queensland Art Gallery were lent to seventeen exhibitions organised by other venues. This included Lloyd Rees' *The sunlit tower*, winner of the 'Jack Manton Prize 1987', loaned to a Paris exhibition of this artist's work.

The Department participated in the revision of the insurance policy for the Collection.

The Department continued investigation of computerisation of Collection records.

A complete inventory of the Collection, with Curatorial participation, was completed during this financial year.

Conservation

Priority was once again given to the programme of practical conservation of paintings and works on paper.

The conservation section was involved in examining and reporting on the condition of all incoming and outgoing works for acquisition and exhibition. The section continued its public enquiry service and its monitoring of environmental conditions. Conservators were involved in the extension services programme in evaluating regional collections and facilities and contributed a number of articles to Conservation journals.

Library

During the year the Library has concentrated on consolidating its special collections and extending its user services.

Emphasis has been placed on the development of a collection of material specifically relating to Queensland Art Gallery activities and exhibitions. The collection includes Queensland Art Gallery exhibition catalogues, ephemeral notices, artists files on microfiche, bibliographies of artists in the collection and slides, photographs and short catalogue entries of the art works.

A broadly indexed file of Queensland regional newspaper cuttings has been established. Although primarily used for current awareness, it is a unique collection with future research value. An ephemera file relating to artists and relevant organisations and subjects has also been established. Material for these files is sorted and indexed by volunteers.

The assistance of a temporary employee during December and January provided a much needed concentration of effort on indexing slides for the general collection.

The Library has acquired a microcomputer. Uses include providing on-line access to the Australian Bibliographic Network, the State Library of Queensland's ORACLE system and major Australian and international arts data bases. This access will improve reference and inter-library loan services and provide ordering and cataloguing information.

Both librarians have continued to participate in professional meetings and seminars. During 1987, Lyndall Carstensen, as Chairperson, co-ordinated the activities of the Queensland Chapter of the Art Libraries Society, Australia and New Zealand. Judy Gunning attended seminars on copyright, the Australian Bibliographic Network and the organizing of audio-visual collections.

In March, both librarian positions were transferred from the State Library of Queensland to the Queensland Art Gallery.

Workshop

Over the past year the Gallery's Artisans have been involved in a number of significant projects, including exhibition support and frame restoration of works in the Collection. Of special interest was a complete restoration of the original seventeenth century frame of the painting *Portrait of the Marchese Filippo Spinola* c.1622-27 by Anthony Van Dyck.

A video of the restoration process and a booklet to advise the public on framing are currently under production.









Presentation to Queensland Museum

On Tuesday 16 September 1986 the Queensland Art Gallery launched its special programme presented in honour of the opening of the new Queensland Museum as Stage 3 of the Queensland Cultural Centre.

The programme of exhibitions presented by the Gallery for the Museum opening illustrated some of the links that bind the various disciplines in our cultural life. The exhibitions in the programme, 'Images: Illusion and Reality', 'Carl McConnell: Master Potter', 'John Gould's Birds and Mammals of Australia' and a display of children's posters organised by the Queensland Museum in association with *The Sunday Mail*, entitled 'Children's Impressions', each illustrated the links that exist between the Gallery and the Museum

To mark the occasion, the Queensland Art Gallery presented to the Queensland Museum a dressing chest of cedar and inlaid woods c.1895, by the Maryborough cabinetmaker John Mason. This most important example of Colonial furniture was acquired by the Queensland Art Gallery in 1984 for presentation to the Queensland Museum.

Queensland Art Gallery Foundation

The year under review saw the final contribution to permit the official closure of the initial Appeal launched with the Foundation's establishment in December, 1979. Funds raised during that period have amounted to \$2 Million, with a generous Government subsidy of \$1 Million, allowing the Gallery to purchase works which have added most significantly to the Queensland Art Gallery's Collection.

The Foundation's second Appeal was launched by the Minister for the Arts, the Honourable Brian Austin, M.L.A., on the occasion of the Foundation's Eighth Annual Dinner held on the 25th March, 1987. The continuing interest of His Excellency, the Governor of Queensland, the Honourable Sir Walter Campbell, Q.C. and Lady Campbell was indicated when at the same function, His Excellency released the second Appeal brochure prepared by the Gallery's Promotions Officer assisted by Foundation staff.

During the course of the year the Foundation continued to contribute to the Gallery's Collection with the purchase of *Infancy, youth and maturity* by Queensland craftsman, L.J. Harvey, a major addition to the Queensland Art Gallery's collection of historical Queensland art, and with assistance towards the purchase of the important Australian landscape painting, *Yan Yean* by Fred Williams.

The generous donation by ACI International Limited to establish an Australian art glass collection was completed during the year with the purchase of *Drought '83* by Ede Horton. Anaconda Australia Inc. continued its sponsorship of travelling exhibitions with the touring of 'The Australian Landscape' exhibition in 1986/87.

Additionally, Foundation Founder Benefactor, CSR Limited furthered their support for the Gallery through the Queensland Art Gallery Foundation with the gift of *The Max Dupain Selected CSR Works* (1950's-1970's) Collection. Max Dupain is acclaimed as one of Australia's most talented and distinguished photographers. The collection of twenty photographs, reprinted to exhibition standard by the artist, is selected from photographs taken of CSR activities in Queensland during his long association with the company.

The important project, 'The Jack Manton Prize', was made possible by a generous donation from the Jack Manton Benefaction. The part sponsorship through the Foundation, which covered Fellowships for members of the Manton family, enabled the publication of the catalogue supporting the Manton Prize and assisted in meeting the Prize award of \$25 000.00.

Once again, under the Presidency of Sir Bruce Watson, Chairman of M.I.M. Holdings Limited, following the Founding President, Sir George Fisher, C.M.G., and the direction given by Sir David Longland, C.M.G., the Foundation has fulfilled a vital role in continuing active support for the Queensland Art Gallery and its objectives in promoting the visual arts in Queensland.

Queensland Art Gallery Society

The Queensland Art Gallery Society, formed in 1951, is a voluntary organisation which aims to stimulate and sustain public interest in the Gallery. Throughout 1986-87 membership of the Society continued to rise steadily.

During the year, the Society donated to the Gallery four traditional Japanese woodblock prints. These were *Untitled* (a picture of the promulgation of the Japanese Constitution) 1889 by Ginko, *Untitled* (three ladies on a verandah) c.1786-92 by Torii Kiyonaga, *Untitled* (a young woman resists the advances of a masked man) 1770 by Suzuki Harunobu and *Untitled* (two ladies standing with a fan) by Kikukawa Eizan. The Society also donated an important work by the Queensland artist Irene Amos, entitled *Create*, preserve, destroy 1982 a neon light piece by New Zealander Paul Hartigan, Fountain of youth, which is a major addition to the Gallery's international art glass Collection.

The Gallery was most appreciative of the assistance from the Society's Volunteers in providing assistance during the exhibition 'Twentieth Century Masters from the Metropolitan Museum of Art, New York'.

For the fourth year in succession, the Society once again generously sponsored the Gallery's highly successful programme, "Music in the Gallery". This programme seeks to complement current exhibitions and it enables leading international, national and local performers to contribute to and enhance the Gallery's atmosphere.

The Trustees are grateful for the work that members of the Society continue to do for the Gallery in supporting acquisitions and in furthering community interest in the Gallery. They also express their appreciation to the retiring President, Mr John Blanshard, and members of his Executive Committee, and welcome the new President, Dr Bruce Gutteridge and the new Executive Committee of the Society.
